Teaching Physician Guidelines

- 1. If the teaching physician is performing interventional procedures, such as myelograms, cardiac caths or TST's is his/her participation required for the entire procedure?
- 2. What is the Medicare rule characterizing "minor procedures"?
- 3. <u>Can a non-physician (eg, NP, PA, or other health care provider) document an encounter and have that documentation used to support a teaching physician's note in the same way as a resident?</u>

1. If the teaching physician is performing interventional procedures, such as myelograms, cardiac caths or TST's is his/her participation required for the entire procedure?

The teaching physician must document his/her participation during the critical portions of the procedure, and must be immediately available for the entire time.

2. What is the Medicare rule characterizing "minor procedures"?

Those procedures with 0-10 global days. Presence throughout the <u>entire</u> procedure must be documented in the medical record.

3. Can a non-physician (eg, NP, PA, or other health care provider) document an encounter and have that documentation used to support a teaching physician's note in the same way as a resident?

Documentation created by a non-MD practitioner (nurse practitioners, PAs, RN's, and other health care practitioners) cannot be used to support a teaching physician's note in the same way as a resident. The teaching physician rules do not apply to NPPs. CMS has a separate policy on shared visits by physicians that include NPPs, relating to physicians in the same group practice.
